

The liturgical year as per the 1980 Alternative Service Book

the following is taken from the notes on the lectionary

Appropriate liturgical colours are suggested: they are not mandatory, and traditional or local uses may be followed where established.

White or gold refers to to the church's festal vestments and hangings which should be predominantly white in colour or gold.

Violet is the colour for Advent and Lent; but it may vary in colour from dark blue through true violet-colour to "roman" purple. In some churches a Lent array of unbleached linen is appropriate for Advent or other occasions. Rose colour is sometimes used as an alternative on the third Sunday in Advent and the fourth Sunday in Lent. Black is sometimes used as an alternative to violet for funerals and on All Souls Day. White is sometimes used for these occasions.

It is also possible to observe saints days and these would be red.
